

HELLO FROM THE MANSE

It is hard to believe that spring is just around the corner as I type my letter from the Manse, as it is still February, but the snowdrops are in full flower. As Rosie and I have our daily walks it is just wonderful to know that the short dark days we have in winter are giving way to longer daylight hours. We are also heading into Lent, and will be in the middle of Lent when our newsletter drops through letter boxes at the beginning of March.

But looking back over our Christmas events though for a moment, there are some 'thank yous' I would like to make. On the Friday before Christmas a number of people, for the first time, took part in Carol Singing around the charge, beginning at Milestone and ending at the Dryburgh Abbey Hotel, where we also went back on Christmas Eve, between singing round the Christmas Tree in Newtown and our Watchnight Service in St Boswells. All of these events would not have been possible without the support of the people who came along, including St Boswells Band who played for us on the Friday, and the people who donated so generously to the Presbytery Malawi Midwife Project. Young people and their parents in our charge who go along to the Wobbly Mile Club on a Friday raised money for the project too at their Christmas Run. So thank you everyone who made it possible and all who contributed in any way.

Lent, like Advent, is a time of preparation, but unlike Advent there is less focus perhaps on what happens. The birth of Jesus is what some might think of as a feel good story – a young woman giving birth to her first child, and the feeling that it invokes. But the journey of Lent is also about a birth. The Easter story is about new life and a second chance for all, whether you regard yourself as a Christian or someone who is seeking: a chance to be born again in Christ, accepting Christ into one's life and heart to be reborn in the Spirit. One of my favourite Bible stories is found in the Gospel of John at Chapter 4 from verse 7, where Jesus meets a woman who has come to the village well to draw water at a time when she thought she would not meet anyone else. She meets Jesus who asks her for a drink, then goes on to say that he can offer her living water, which would mean that one would never be thirsty again; as in verse 14: 'but whoever drinks the water I shall give will never again be thirsty, The water that I shall give will be a spring of water within him, welling up and bringing eternal life. Christ dying on the cross and rising on Easter Sunday fulfilled that promise of life giving water.



a Look Back

As we all look forward to spring flowers, warm sunshine and longer days, let's take a look back at events within the Charge over the last three months.

St Boswells and Newtown Churches held their traditional annual Christmas Fairs during November and, as always, the local community was very supportive. These are our main fund raising events of the year and their success in raising £1302 and £1275 respectively was greatly appreciated. Also in November, we celebrated St Andrew's Day with a united evening communion service in St Boswells Church.

At the start of Advent, a traditional Christmas lunch was enjoyed in St Boswells Church Hall and raised £541 for church funds. That evening the annual service of Lessons and Carols in Newtown Church, this year featuring music from St Boswells Band, was enjoyed. The contribution from Newtown Primary School pupils who read the lessons and sang in the choir was greatly appreciated by the congregation.

On 22nd December, a group of carol singers from all parts of the Charge, accompanied by St Boswells Band, visited various venues within the community where they received a warm welcome and very generous donations to the chosen charity which was Midwife Training in Malawi. The carol singers were even invited back to Dryburgh Abbey Hotel on Christmas Eve to entertain the guests who were there to celebrate Christmas .

On Christmas Eve, around 60 excited children and their families arrived at St Boswells Church Hall to make Christingles which were then carefully transported across to the church for an impromptu nativity play. There was more carol singing round the Christmas Tree at Newtown in the early evening, again accompanied by St Boswells Band. Later that evening, a united Watchnight Service was held in St Boswells Church, where we were


pleased to welcome some of the guests staying at Dryburgh Abbey Hotel.

On Christmas Day, a united family service at Newtown saw some of the children showing, and demonstrating, gifts they had received. Due to very generous donations received at the carol singing, from the participants in the Wobbly Mile at St Boswells and at our special services the wonderful total of £764 was raised for Midwife Training in Malawi.

Later on Christmas Day, an invitation was extended to everyone to meet in St Boswells Church Hall for soup and mince pies.

On the first Sunday in January a united Café Church was held in St Boswells Church Hall. This new venture – a different and more relaxed way of worshipping - was well

attended and greatly enjoyed by all who came along.





The last event in February, St Boswells Church first Coffee morning of the year on the 10th, raised £339.30.

We never take for granted, and are always grateful for, the generous support we receive from the comminity.

Call for Contributions to Female Ministry Celebration

An appeal has been issued for contributions

to next year's celebration of the 50th anniversary of women being admitted to the Ministry of Word and Sacrament in the Church of Scotland.

The project has been launched by New College and Edinburgh University Centre for Theology and Public Issues, supported by the Church of Scotland's Ministries Council;



and it will include an exhibition, conference, act of worship, events and publications.

Project co-ordinator, Dr Lesley Orr, says: 'We hope to celebrate all the gifts and blessings that diverse women have brought through their faithful ministries over the past

fifty years. But we also want to reflect on some of the wider themes and challenges of equal ministry and gender justice for church and society as we consider the current situation and look to the future.

'We want to ensure that our research is firmly grounded in the sources and materials of those who have been involved (as ministers, relations, congregational members, colleagues...) in the unfolding story.

'We would love to gather recollections and reflections of the past fifty years and more – particularly but not only of the early pioneers. We also hope to gather images and artefacts for the exhibition.'

What is Alpha?

Alpha is a series of sessions exploring the Christian faith, typically run over eleven weeks. Each talk looks at a different question around faith and is designed to create conversation. Alpha is run all around the globe, and everyone is welcome. It runs in cafés, churches, universities, homes – you name it. No two Alphas look the same, but generally they have three key things in common: food, a talk and good conversation.

First up there's

Food - Whether it's a group of friends gathered around a kitchen table, or a quick catch up over coffee and cake, food has a way of bringing people together. It's no different at Alpha. Most sessions start with food, because it's a great way to build community and get to know each other.

Then a

Talk - The talks are designed to engage and inspire conversation. Usually around thirty minutes long, they can be given as a live talk or played as a video. They explore the big issues around faith and unpack the basics of Christianity, addressing questions from: Who is Jesus? and How can we have faith? to Why and how do I pray? and How does God guide us?

Followed by

Discussion - Probably the most important part of any Alpha: the chance to share thoughts and ideas on the topic, and simply discuss it in a small group. There's no obligation to say anything and there's nothing you can't say (seriously). It's an opportunity to hear from others and contribute your own perspective in an honest, friendly and open environment.
